<p>Enquiry/Project work</p>	<p>Today, we are continuing our still life drawings.</p>																					

30 minutes	<p>Still life is drawing an object that has been chosen and placed somewhere like a table or the floor, depending on its size.</p> <p>When you draw the object you need to consider the shape, the areas where the light brightens its colour or leaves darker shades.</p> <p>I would like you to choose any object that is yellow as the subject of your still life. Maybe there are some bananas in the kitchen you could use, or you have a yellow toy. The choice is yours.</p> <p>The picture can be coloured in using colouring pencils or paints if you have some available. Remember, it is more than just the shape of the object, look at the shade and colour too. Enjoy.</p>
